We are so pleased to see that this process has been expedited with all Bluewater employees now eligible for their first doses. To ensure the safe reopening of our schools, additional protection for our staff is a next step to reduce the risk of COVID-19 and avoid further disruption in our school communities. Building for the Future

Through Ministry of Education funding, new build projects are on the horizon to further expand learning opportunities for our current and future students. These include:

- 1.5 million-dollar <u>child care centre addition at Spruce</u> <u>Ridge Community School</u> in Durham, which will add 39 licensed spaces to the existing program
- 26.4 million-dollar Grades 7-12 replacement for Kincardine District Senior School
- 29.4 million-dollar Georgian Bay Community School replacement in Meaford opening to JK-12 students in September
- JK-8 replacement for Beavercrest Community School in Markdale valued at \$6.4 million with an additional \$2.1 million for two child care rooms and two EarlyON rooms

2021-22 Budget

Trustees continue to work through the 2021-22 budget process. A public budget consultation survey recently enabled parents/guardians, students, and staff to submit feedback on the focus areas they consider to be most important for the next school year. According to the <u>survey</u> results, educational programs and services that rank highest in priority include 'reading and writing skills', followed by 'math', and 'mental health and well-being'. <u>Click</u> here to learn more about the 2021-22 budget. Trustees Voice Online Learning Concerns



In a letter to Minister of Education Stephen Lecce, trustees recently expressed concerns over a possible move by the provincial government to change how eLearning is delivered to students in Ontario. This information has come to light in various media reports referencing private government documents. The plan would also include a push to make remote learning a permanent option for those who choose this method of education delivery. If implemented, the delivery of eLearning courses would shift from the current localized approach to a centralized model coordinated through TVO/TFO. There are several concerns related to this proposed plan, including the loss of involvement and expertise of local educators. In regard to the plan for a permanent online option, there are concerns related to the potential impacts on in-person learning, such as staffing and resources. Trustees are requesting that public conversations related to the proposed plan involve consultation with school boards and education stakeholders in Ontario. As we continue to gather evidence from this past year on the full impact of online learning, we want to work with our provincial and education partners to ensure any plan meets the local needs of students, while honouring the firsthand expertise and leadership of school boards.
